





An Inter-sectional approach to Anti-Racist and Anti-Oppressive Practice



This half day workshop will be focussed on what it means to be anti-racist and anti-oppressive with a specific focus on adultification and its link to bias and racial prejudice. The workshop will also introduce attendees to the framework of Intersectionality as a helpful tool to understand power and privilege in different contexts and how an awareness of people's unique intersecting identities can result in a more helpful and nuanced approach to anti-racist and anti-oppressive practice.

It will be delivered in an accessible and relational way to ensure attendees are able to engage as effectively as possible with the content. It will be delivered through a mixture of presentation, group discussion, pair-work and reflection. Attendees will leave with practical tools they can take away and use straight away in their work, with the aim of feeling more confident and equipped to apply anti-racist and anti-oppressive practice in their work.

Learning outcomes

• To examine what it means to be anti-racist and anti-oppressive in practice, including developing an awareness of key relevant terminology relating to anti-oppressive and anti-racist practice.

• To examine one's own biases, assumptions and beliefs and how they may show up in work, as well identifying tools to unpick these further.

• To demonstrate an understanding of Intersectionality as a tool/framework for understanding oppression and marginalisation.

• To discuss and define adultification and recognise how it may show up in work and consider ideas and strategies to notice and address when this may be happening in line with anti-racist values.

• To consider goals and actions that could be taken in order to develop personal accountability to practice in a more anti-racist and anti-oppressive way.

Communication and Conflict Resolution

This half day workshop will be focussed on the importance of effective communication in seeking to address conflict in the workplace. It will be delivered in an accessible and relational way to ensure attendees are able to engage as effectively as possible with the content. It will be delivered through a mixture of presentation, group discussion, pairwork and reflection. Attendees will leave with practical tools they can take away and use straight away in their work, with the aim of feeling more confident and equipped to better manage conflict in the workplace.

Learning Outcomes:

• To explore and unpick definitions of 'conflict'.

• To examine one's own relationship with 'conflict' and how this may impact on work and practice, including recognising one's own behaviours and how they may affect oneself and others in different ways.

• To be able to effectively identify potential areas of conflict at work and to understand the different formal routes to support/escalation.

• To consider different communication tools to effectively resolve conflict in the workplace, with a specific focus on active listening.

• To practise applying conflict resolution strategies to a work-based scenario example.

Crossing the Line (criminal exploitation, knife crime, county lines)



Aims of the training

Using a new interactive, research and theory-based simulation training tool aimed at practitioners, participants will:

Use the contextual safeguarding approach to develop an understanding of criminal exploitation, knife crime and county lines via different characters aged nine to 16, explore different roles, risks and responsibilities within criminal exploitation networks

use compelling research-based 'characters' to assess the risks of grooming, entrapment and serious violence evaluate risks in terms of gender and roles and across the life course

through an interactive street map linked to the characters, evaluate safeguarding pathways for individuals and evaluate the potential risks associated with different types of interventions

explore professionals within the context of communities who are key in assessing risks and safeguarding children and young people involved in criminal exploitation

explore and have the opportunity to develop a tailored action plan within a safeguarding framework for working with criminally exploited children

How does the simulation training work? Use the interactive character maps in small groups Assess protective factors and complete an activity Participate in a whole group discussion on findings Create a tailored contextual safeguarding plan There is a live facilitator to help guide you through, and explore concepts

Advantages of this simulation training Learn by doing and making 'live' decisions for better retention Offers change of pace Allows high risk decision making in a safe environment Improves critical thinking by analysing of each character's journey

Complications from Excess Weight Service (CEW) Training Day

Great Ormond Street Hospital (GOSH), Complications from Excess Weight Service (CEW) is a specialist clinic supporting children/young people who are referred to our service due to concerns of childhood obesity. The team consists of a Lead Paediatric Consultant, Dietitian/Nutritionist, Physiotherapist, Clinical Nurse, Psychologist, Occupational Therapist, Family Therapist and Social Worker. Our specialist team complete an initial telephone consultation, followed by a half day assessment at GOSH to gain a holistic view of the child/young person's life. My role as the Social Worker is to ascertain and address any social care issues that have come to light during the assessment process. I then access support locally and/or work with the professional network around the family to understand how we can work together to best support going forward, as we understand that there are many factors that impact weight gain that is not always directly linked to poor health – factors such as trauma, abuse, family dysfunction/chaos, parental mental health/trauma, alongside many other factors have an impact on childhood obesity. Our overall goal is to support with weight loss and implementing healthier life-style choices for better overall health and well-being.

During my time at CEW and working with local social care services it has become clear that there is a gap in knowledge and understanding of the role social care play when working with children/young people who suffer with obesity due to the psychological, emotional, and neurological (neurodiversity issues/disability) issues that play a role in excess weight gain. Therefore, this training will help bring understanding of factors that impact childhood obesity, social care's role and how we work together to best support the children/young people and their families.

Female Genital Mutilation (FGM)

FGM (Female Genital Mutilation) training for frontline professionals.

The training session aims to equip professionals with knowledge of a cultural and taboo issue, increase awareness and safeguard girls from FGM. The World Health Organisation estimates that 3 million girls undergo some form of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) each year. Female Genital Mutilation is illegal in the UK but still affects a significant number of British girls and foreign nationals from a variety of cultures.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of the training participants will be able to:

- Describe what FGM is, different types of FGM and cultural underpinnings.
- Understand the prevalence of FGM and identify high risk communities in Newham.
- · Understand the law in relation to FGM
- Be aware that FGM in young women below the age of eighteen is 'child abuse' a violation of the child's right to life, their body integrity as well as their right to health.
- Be able to recognise what the signs and indicators of FGM are and to make appropriate referrals to safeguard children and young people.
- Know the barriers and challenges for survivors accessing health services and making referrals of FGM survivors to specialists' services across London.
- Help available for professionals.

Intersectionality



..... is the interconnected relationship of social categorisations such as race, gender, and sexual orientation together with individual vulnerability and adversities suffered by the individual. It is important to consider the potential to learn from issues of 'intersectionality' as some children feature more (or less) in the statistics, for example, Black boys and increased incidents of serious youth violence in London. Racism, bias, stereotyping, or cultural misunderstanding operate at the individual, institutional and societal levels, both consciously and unconsciously – which may result in some children being more likely to come to the attention of child protection services. Equity is an essential consideration for our services, not only in our actions but also in our decision-making process.

Intersectionality is a tool for analysing how different forms of oppression, inequality and disadvantage (e.g. ageism, racism, sexism, ableism, heterosexism, classism) interact and intersect to influence lived experiences (Bernard, 2020). This understanding offers a lens to see someone better and to offer better practice, both in practice and crucially in our working environments.

What is Intersectionality?



Adultification....

.....is a harmful practice where children are treated as if they are adults, often incorrectly. This means these children are viewed as less innocent and more adult-like, which can lead to feelings of being over-policed and unsafe at school. The Commission on Young Lives in England (2022) reported that Black children are more likely to face harsher punishments in school due to a process called "Adultification". It can lead to Black children being treated like criminals and taking on adult responsibilities at a young age.

This can reduce the responsibility of professionals to safeguard and protect children while increasing children's responsibility to protect themselves. Addressing the issue of Adultification and premature sexualisation of children is crucial. Adultification can also cause children to behave more maturely than their peers, which may not be developmentally appropriate.

Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES)

ACE's are events that can have a potentially traumatic impact on children during their formative years (0-17 years). These experiences include violence, abuse, neglect, witnessing violence in the home or community, and having a family member attempt or die by suicide.

Additionally, aspects of a child's environment, such as growing up in a household with substance use problems, mental health problems, or instability due to parental separation or household members being in jail or prison, can also undermine a child's sense of safety, stability, and bonding.

It's important to note that the examples provided are not an exhaustive list of adverse experiences - many other traumatic experiences could impact health and well-being, such as not having enough food to eat, experiencing homelessness or unstable housing, or experiencing discrimination.

ACEs are linked to chronic health problems, mental illness, and substance use problems in adolescence and adulthood, and can also have a negative impact on education, job opportunities, and earning potential. However, it is possible to prevent ACEs from occurring.
